## **Deepening Our Roots**

#### OUTREACH AND ENGAGEMENT





We helped the <u>Love Package Project</u> pack bags for 65 parents in March. Items packed included diapers, baby hygiene products, infant feeding tools, and body affirming items that support parents through the immediate postpartum period and beyond. In June we gathered at The Native in Logan Square for our fifth annual Plantasia Plant Sale Fundraiser. Thanks to plant donations from the folks at <u>Flowers</u> for Dreams and <u>NPK Associates</u>, we raised just over \$1,700 for our work and the work of our newest partner cohort—The Evolved Network, Ujimaa Medics, and the AFIRE Chicago. Thanks to everyone who showed up and showed support!





#### SPONSORSHIPS

This year we committed \$7,500 to Free Root Operation (FRO)'s BLOOM Cohort, a 6-month program that deepens Black and Brown women's relationship to self-care, self-love, and nourishment. During the program, the women engage in wellness workshops, adopt new practices, build community, embark on excursions, and work with a social worker to set and attain goals. In addition to the \$7,500 sponsorship, we're providing free services for most of 2023. We are excited to report that FRO graduated their inaugural cohort of 8 women last December, and their successes continued after graduating from BLOOMone woman finished her degree and another secured a community organizing position with the City of Chicago. A new cohort of 15 women began last month, and we're so excited to see how the program and the women they serve continue to grow!





We are also a proud sponsor of Gyrls in the H.O.O.D., committing \$10,000 in direct cash support this year.

In March 2023, <u>Gyrls in the H.O.O.D.</u> opened their first brick-and-mortar location, the Gyrls in the H.O.O.D. Reproductive Health Services Center. Located at 605 E. 71st Greater Grand Crossing, the Center is a safe, nurturing space for gyrls to access resources like groceries and period products, education support through the Degrees B4 Diapers program, and quality, compassionate care.

Additionally, the H.O.O.D. Closet program has served over 1,500 people since opening its free store in March. The Closet allows gyrls in need to shop for free items such as clothes, hygiene products, baby products, and other necessities that are all too often out of reach for our community members.

#### **EVOLVING RELATIONSHIPS**






<u>Sista Afya Community Care</u> (SACC) has evolved from a 2021–22 partner to a sliding-scale client. SACC focuses its programs on serving Black women who are in their young adult years (ages 18–35), helping to change the trajectory of their lives by engaging them in culturally responsive and gender-responsive mental wellness care. <u>Learn more</u> about how our relationship has continued to develop over the years Gyrls in the H.O.O.D. joined the WU! community as a 2022–23 partner. 








### A Budding Future


We prioritize and uplift the voices of marginalized people in all aspects of our operations. Our talented team harnesses the power of diverse, bad ass folks to provide high-quality services with integrity.





Our work is made possible and funded through collective growth. We're a community driven by regular folks, who give what they can to make our world a better place. By pooling our resources, we're making a difference that has ripple effects across the city.

- Our median one-time gift is \$21: our donors show that philanthropic giving can be accessible and inclusive to many.
- The WU! Crew's monthly donor pool is growing. We are supported monthly by 74 donors who give \$1,483.13 in total.
- The average monthly gift is \$20.04, with gifts ranging from \$5.50 to \$100 per month.



Putting our values into practice: At WU! we are committed to providing livable wages and a safety net of benefits that are available to both full-time employees and contractors.

- 65% of contractors are participating in WU!'s up to 3% retirement match program
- Average hourly contractor rate is \$40.77, \$11/hr more than a livable wage for an adult with no children living in Chicago (Massachusetts Institute of Technology)
- Average hourly wage has increased by more than \$10/hr (a 36% increase) since we brought on our first contractor in 2019

Contractors who work 100 hours or more per month are eligible for:

- \$200/month childcare stipend that can be used to cover any costs associated with child care
- \$200/month health stipend that can be used to cover any health care costs

#### **BOARD GROWTH**

In March, we welcomed two new board members, <u>Sophia Madana</u> and <u>Lauren Nelson</u>. Both women bring an incredible network and array of experiences that will certainly help grow our community.

#### UJIMAA MEDICS


Swahili for "collective work and responsibility," <u>Ujimaa Medics</u> provides emergency first response training, primarily to South Side and West Side Chicagoans where shootings often occur.





#### AFIRE

Founded by Filipino immigrants, <u>Alliance of Filipinos</u> for Immigrant Rights and Empowerment (AFIRE) is a non-partisan grassroots community organization that works to build the capacity of Filipinx/a/os to organize toward progressive change. AFIRE amplifies the voices of those most silenced in the Filipino community: undocumented families, new immigrants and refugees, domestic workers, lowwage workers, seniors, and youth.



#### THE EVOLVED NETWORK

<u>The Evolved Network</u> hosts experiential culinary and gardening programming that equip youth in systemically oppressed communities with transformative healing, skills, and support.
